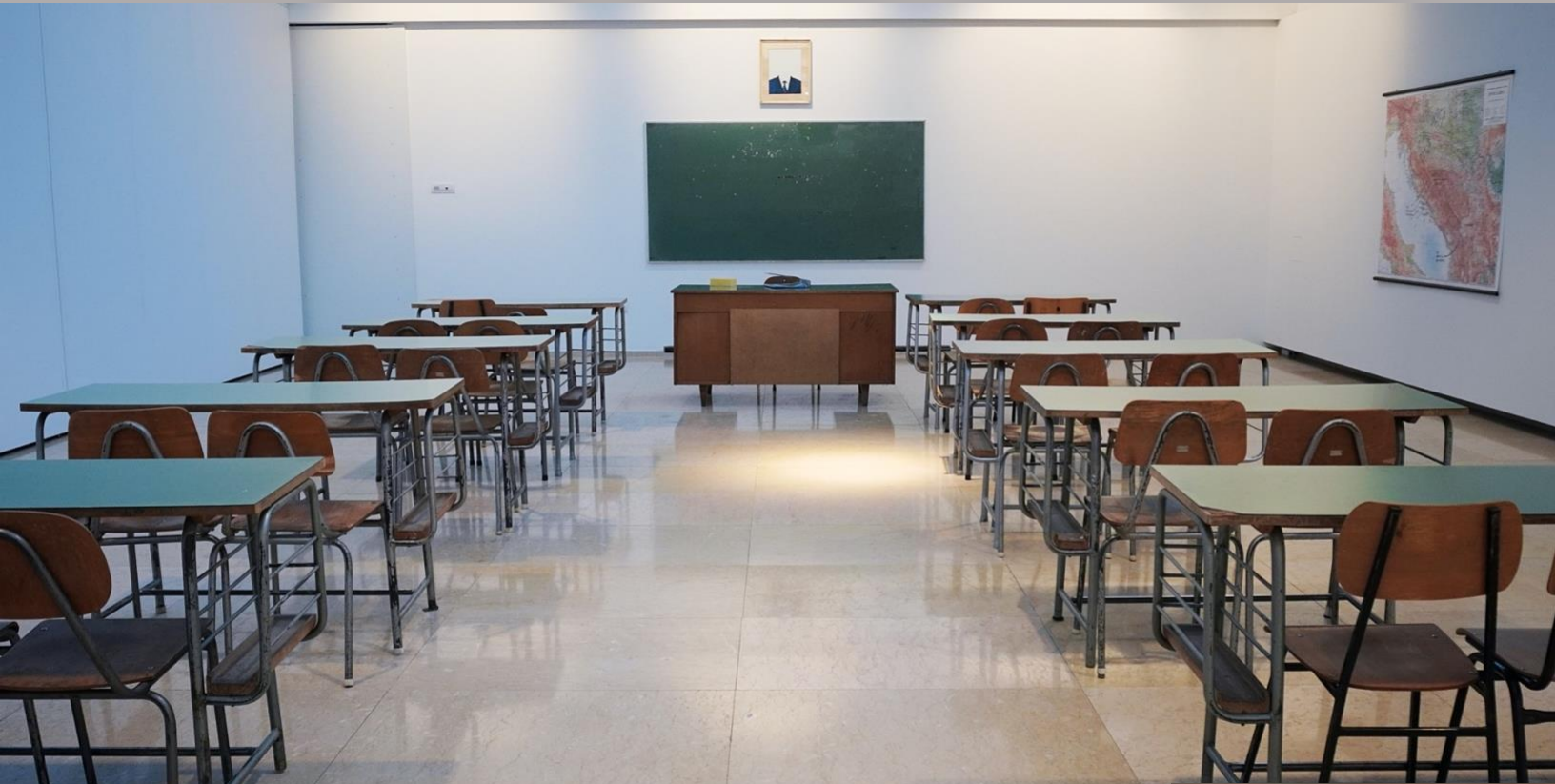

She also serves as a consultant to Denver metro area school districts on issues such as social-emotional learning, mental health, and crisis intervention. Her area of research specialization includes youth suicide, school safety, and crisis response and intervention.

Lisa M Lee, PhD, MA, MS, is Associate Vice President for Scholarly Integrity and Research Compliance and faculty in the Department of Population Health Sciences at Virginia Tech. From 2012-2017, she served as Executive Director of President Obama's bioethics commission. She worked for 14 years at the CDC, where she served as the agency's Assistant Science Office, director of the Office of Scientific Integrity, and Chief Science Officer in the office of surveillance and epidemiology. She is an epidemiologist, bioethicist, and ethics educator.
